- Do you have internet?
- Types of Internet Carriers:
 - Cable (ex. Time Warner, Frontier)
 - Phone lines (ex. At&T U-verse)
 - Phone Plans (ex. AT&T 4G HotSpot, Verizon 4G plans)
- Types of internet:
 - Hard wired (Usually a cable or phone line is connected directly to the computer)
 - Wireless Internet
 - 4G/Hot Spots

Finding the Connection



- Look at the bottom bar of your computer or device.
 - You should see one of the two symbols above indicating you device can connect to Wi-Fi.
 - Right-Click on this icon and select “Connect to Network”
 - A Pop-up menu will appear and allow you to log on or connect.

Chrome

Google Inc. (USA)

Has to be downloaded and installed



Internet Explorer

Microsoft Corporation (USA)

Available only for the Windows operating system & comes pre-installed



Firefox

Mozilla Foundation (USA)

Has to be downloaded and installed



Safari

Apple Inc. (USA)


Pre-installed on Apple computers, iPads and iPods

An internet browser connects you to the WideWorldWeb.

- Left Double click and wait for a page to open

Using a Web Browser



- **Web Address**
 - A Web address, is an address where things can be found online. It's how a website identifies its location on the web.
- **Refresh page** 
 - When to click the icon, the browser will re-check with the web server to make sure it has the latest copy of the web page you are viewing.
- **Forward/Backward Navigation**
 - The arrows at the top of a page that changes the web page to the page before the current page and back.

Refresh/Reload

This is where you type in your web address.
